Karie has really been the catalyst for all of the happenings. This has also meant the hiring of the nurse, Marianne Posatia. She has proven to be a very good worker, and more knowledgeable than we could have hoped. She is already giving injections, stitching up wounds, and amputated an old man's little toe. Already she has saved us at least 4 evacuations where in the past we would have to take them to Angoram or someplace else. However, because of her expertise, she has handled the situations right here in Samban.

### vehicle uppate

Japan. Looking
back on all
the hoops that
we had to get
through, it is

it was very frustrating. It sat on the dock in Lae for 2 weeks

waiting for customs to clear it. When it was finally cleared, although scheduled to be on the ship, it wasn't sent. So William Butler, a PBT missionary friend, who happened to be in Lae for the day, picked it up for us

and drove it back to Madang over the weekend. The major problem with waiting for it was the amount of time we had to spend in town away from Samban. Yet God's timing was better than ours. For one, we had taken a young lady into town for some blood tests. It ended up that we had to send the blood to Australia for the testing. She was diagnosed with Hashimoto's Disease. Which basically means that her thyroid was producing to much "stuff" (medical term for Jesse). It

meant her heart was running a marathon even when she was sitting still, 150 beats a minute. It took the month we were waiting for her meds to be regulated.

The other reason God's timing was better was the arrival of a new table saw sent to us from the U.S. It did not ship to Madang, but got shipped to Ukarumpa. Since the vehicle had just arrived, we were able to travel to Ukarumpa via the new vehicle, uncrate the new saw, disassemble it, weigh the individual pieces, and get it ready for shipment on the airplane to Samban.

The tablesaw arrived in Samban on the 24th of December. MAF brought it in their "big" plane. It was exciting for us to see the saw, see the big airplane, and the village was in awe of the airplane as well. The last time a plane that size landed in Samban was when I (Jesse) was a senior in high school in 1995.

I spent the time prior to it's arrival in Samban organizing the workshop, under the classroom, so it could be brought in and put back together. At this point we haven't started it yet. As soon as we get a chance to get the correct wire and plugs we will be making sawdust!
